Program 22 – "He Ain't Heavy, He's My Brother" © 1969 Bob Russell, Bobby Scott

First recorded by Joe Cocker (a version never released)¹, the Hollies' 1969 hit recording of "He Ain't Heavy, He's My Brother" is best known and remembered today. Wikipedia notes that this song "...became one of the most defining and enduring tunes of that era. It has also become an anthem for brotherly love"²



- Reached #3 in the UK and #7 in the United States after release in 1969.
- #1 for 2 weeks in UK after re-release in 1988, after its use in a Miller Beer commercial
- Featured Elton John on piano, and lead singer Allan Clarke
- The only collaboration between songwriters Bobby Scott ("A Taste of Honey") and Bob Russell ("Little Green Apples"; "The Night The Lights Went Out In Georgia")
- Recorded after Graham Nash had left group to form Crosby, Stills & Nash
- Also recorded by, (among others) Neil Diamond, Cher, Donny Hathaway, Osmonds, Olivia Newton-John, Barry Manilow, Bill Medley, and Christian music artist Clay Crosse
- Title drawn from motto for Boys Town in Omaha, Nebraska, formed in 1917, where troubled or homeless boys could come for help; Boys Town was also a 1938 movie
 - In September 1924, the first editor of Kiwanis Magazine, Roe Fulkerson, published a column entitled "He Ain't Heavy, He's My Brother". The article speaks of Fulkerson's inspiring encounter with "a spindly and physically weak lad" carrying a baby and "staggering towards a neighboring park"

" 'Pretty big load for such a small kid' I said as I met him. 'Why, mister,' he smiled, 'He ain't heavy; he's my brother.' "1,2"

"Keep on loving each other as brothers" – Hebrews 13:1, NIV

An excellent article by Jon Zens and Cliff Bjork notes that -

"...these two duties: godliness and faithful witness, sum up our entire responsibility toward unbelievers...Our responsibility toward each other as fellow recipients of God's mercy and love, however, goes much deeper. And there is a good reason why. While we may find ourselves necessarily involved with unbelievers as the result of various human relationships (mother/son, brother/sister, employer/employee, etc.), we have no spiritual union with unbelievers beyond those human ties. When it comes to our relationship with fellow believers, however, human ties are no longer the defining issue. No matter what our previous human relationships, in Christ we have been joined by his Spirit into one body in an organic union not unlike the relationship of arm to hand or leg to foot (see 1 Corinthians 12:12.27)"

Final Thoughts:

Jesus made it clear that we are brothers and sisters in the faith if we do the will of God. I have attended many churches over the years where believers address each other as, e.g., "Brother Johnson", or "Sister Daniels". While we have God-ordained responsibilities toward neighbors, leaders, enemies, etc., let's recognize the special relationship we have with other believers as part of the universal body of Christ. Let's prayerfully consider how we can help our brothers and sisters in Christ, both here at home, and where fellow believers around the world suffer for their faith in Jesus.
