Several times a year her mother and the little girl correspond with one another, sending pictures, or drawings.

Child sponsorship is a way that we can really make a difference in the world. My son sponsors a child in Uganda and another in Honduras through Compassion International ([www.compassion.com](http://www.compassion.com)). This past year he made trips to both countries and personally met them. What a meaningful time, meeting a child that he has had a big part in educating and providing the basic necessities of life.

This year I presented the child sponsorship idea to my church. Many families have signed up; they really want to make a difference in someone's life. Sponsoring a child can be a great activity for the entire family, providing opportunity to grow culturally while at the same time teaching our own children the values of caring and sharing.

There is an old story of some tourists who were walking on a beach in Mexico when a poor looking campesino approached them. They watched as he would walk a few steps, reach down, pick up something and throw it into the ocean.
